The 2019 Conference Planning Committee is pleased to announce another plenary – The Competition on Legal Information Extraction and Entailment (COLIEE) at CALL/ACBD 2019.

Session Abstract

The current Artificial Intelligence (AI) pandemic seems to impinge on everything, including all aspects of legal reasoning and the structure of legal systems. Most aspects at the intersection of formulation, abstraction, and legal decision making impinge on a legal reasoning competition (the Competition on Legal Information Extraction and Entailment or "COLIEE"), which has run for five years, and reveals potentially useful frameworks for legal reasoning, as well as the deep challenges. We use both the framework summary and COLIEE to illustrate the challenges and potential of the future of legal information processing.

Speaker Abstract

Randy Goebel is currently a professor in the Department of Computing Science at the University of Alberta, Associate Vice President (Research) and Associate Vice President (Academic), and Fellow and co-founder of the Alberta Machine Intelligence Institute (AMII). He holds a BSc (Computer Science), MSc (Computing Science), and Ph.D. (Computer Science) from the Universities of Regina, Alberta, and British Columbia, respectively. Professor Goebel's theoretical work on abduction, hypothetical reasoning and belief revision is internationally well known, and his recent research is focused on the formalization of visualization and explainable artificial intelligence (XAI). He has been a professor or visiting professor at the University of Waterloo, University of Regina, University of Tokyo, Hokkaido University, Multi-media University (Malaysia), National Institute of Informatics, and a visiting researcher at NICTA (now Data 61) in Australia, and DFKI and VW Data:Lab in Germany. He has worked on optimization, algorithm complexity, systems biology, and natural language processing, including applications in legal reasoning and medical informatics.
